- 3. Describe and participate in traditional seasonal activities, and use associated vocabulary and phrases.
- 4. Identify and place summer solstice on the Dee Ni calendar.
- 5. Understand that Summer is the time to be outside, a time for community gatherings (i.e. Pow Wow, Camps, Picnics, etc.).
- 6. Play Shinny, a traditional game

Activity/Project Description:

- ➤ Teacher presents vocabulary words associated with the four seasons to the class using audio recordings and flash cards. The lessons will be presented during the appropriate month.
- Teacher leads students in "Big Dipper and the Milky Way" story activity.
- Teacher selects one or more seasonal activities to do, as time allows.
- Students take home a Summer activities "Kit", including a sunrise/sunset calendar.

- > Students write "Thank You" cards and decorate them with pictures illustrating school activities they enjoyed to be presented to people/businesses who have supported the activities of the school curriculum.
- > Students make Shinny sticks and learn to play the game with them.
- > Students use Dee Ni journals and continue to use vocabulary in everday situations. Students should be encouraged to maek entries, sketches, collages, photographs with associated vocabulary, as often as possible.
- ➤ *Optional* Teacher reviews Nee Dash and Pow Wow lesson/activities.
