## Activity/Project Description:

- Students continue to participate in "calendar" activities learned in previous lessons,
- K-6 students/teachers provide a copy of weekly classroom newsletters; 5<sup>th</sup> graders use prior knowledge and other resources to create Dee Ni translations of content.
- $\blacktriangleright$  Completed translations are delivered to  $3^{rd}$  grade for posting on the big calendar.
- Translated newsletters are word-processed. Information deemed noteworthy by the translators is included in "announcements" – cultural seasonal activities in particular.
- Classroom teachers and students provide 1 3 Dee Ni sentences from their current Dee Ni lessons to be translated into English and serve as a review of previously learned materials, or as an introduction for newer speakers.
- Students use bulletins and other sources of information to develop a bilingual script.
- Students work in pairs or small groups to relay information on the PA system in the morning.
- Announcements should include a thought, word, or phrase for the day. Students "caught" using these words should be rewarded (Warrior Prides).
- > Announcements could include a recitation of the Dee Ni Pledge.

- If possible, information should be word-processed and provided for reading/downloading/printing from the school web page.
- > Anyone interested in hiring this "Translation Service" could do so... for a price!
